

Rector's Reflections



Dear Friends,

How do we live as resurrection people in the wilderness of Lent or any other wilderness? As I write this column on the first day of spring, we are not even at the mid-point of our Lenten journey. And yet, as the days grow longer and we see a bit more sunshine, I find myself thinking more about resurrection than about Lent. We are, after all, resurrection people even in the midst of this season of penitence and preparation.

First, I believe that we "do" wilderness together as the Body of Christ whether we are intentionally engaging a liturgical season or we are forced into a wilderness not of our own choosing. As Paul says in First Corinthians, when one part of the body suffers, we all suffer and when one part of the body rejoices, we all rejoice. As Christians, we are one body so we are in the wilderness together.

Secondly, I believe that we are called to seek out the Risen Christ in the midst of the wilderness. Where is Christ at work among us during Lent? Where is Christ at work among us in seasons of grief, loss, or hard-ship? Sometimes we cannot see Christ at work ourselves and we have to rely on others, and sometimes we have to be Christ at work for others. We "do" wilderness together for a reason!

Thirdly, as resurrection people, we believe that the wilderness, while quite real, neither has the final word nor is our final destination. Love will triumph over hate. Joy will conquer despair. And life will conquer death.

As we journey through the Lenten wilderness, let us do so together. Together we can find the Risen Christ at work in the wilderness and together we can journey knowing that the power of life and love will prevail.

I wish you all a blessed Lenten season. As we look forward to the Resurrection, I want to give a reflection of what Holy Week means to me. I think of Holy Week like reading a book. One does not read only the first chapter and the last chapter of a book. When you read a book, you want to read and digest every word so you get the full story. I equate this to Lent and Holy Week. Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter are chapters in the story of Christ, each giving context to the next. If I thought I didn't have to go to Maundy Thursday or Good Friday services because I already know the story, then I wouldn't be doing justice to the joyous occasion of Easter. Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday prepare us for the Crucifixion, to remind us why Jesus died. I encourage you all to come to the other services in Holy Week, not just Easter. Easter is a joyous occasion, but how would we know the magnitude of that joy if we had not gone through the pain and suffering of Holy Week?



Frolic

Have you ever seen a movie or video of an Amish barn raising and wondered what it would be like to be a part of something like that? A barn raising is an example of a "frolic" - a work event that combines socializing with a practical goal. This year, there will be three opportunities for you to "frolic" with other folks from Christ Church as we work with Danielle Woods, a future Habitat homeowner to build her new home in Twinsburg. As you can see in the picture below, construction is already under way. The first workday opportunity for Christ Church will be Saturday, April 4th.

If you're thinking, "I'd like to help someone else out, and I'd like to get to know others at Christ Church a little better ... but I'm not very handy", read on. Habitat for Humanity has been helping unskilled (but thoughtful) volunteers (18 or older) to build homes for others for over 40 years. On a typical workday, an experienced supervisor instructs volunteers on the tasks of that workday during the first hour and then observes their progress as they begin the work themselves. By the end of the second hour, volunteers are chatting together as they share the task they've been assigned, be that putting in new windows or doors, hanging vinvl siding, hanging drywall, or installing baseboard and trim around windows and doors. The workday is from 9 AM to 3:30 PM with lunch at noon and short breaks in the morning and afternoon. It's always a bit of a surprise to see how much has been accomplished by the end of the day. And it's fun to acquire a new skill, too.

Members of Christ Church have joined with other churches in Hudson to build a new home for a Summit County family every year for the past 20 years. If you'd like to be a part of that tradition, email Len Harrison at harrison13n@gmail.com for more information.







Spicy Lamb Farm Spring Fling

Join us at The Spicy Lamb Farm's Spring Fling on Saturday, April 13th from noon to 4pm. The Rev. Charlotte Collins Reed will be blessing the sheep at 1pm. Seating is limited so visitors are encouraged to bring a lawn chair if they want to sit and relax while watching. Kilts are encouraged. Spicy Lamb Farm is owned by parishioner Laura and Michael Minnig.

The farm will be open for visitors from noon to 4pm. When you visit the farm, enjoy watching the ewe flock being shorn. Visitors can even try their hand at shearing through the Adopt-a-Sheep program that ends with an heirloom blanket in time for next winter.

At the farm, you can also enjoy seeing any lambs, ducklings, or bunnies that have arrived. Down at the trial field, herding demonstrations will be taking place. At 3pm, there will be a youth theatre performance from the same group who turn our sheep barn into a Player's Barn each August. We also invited exhibitors to the farm for you to visit.

Boston Mills Road is under construction but you can still get through to the farm. This event tends to get very crowded. Please plan ahead for ride sharing, parking, and walking. We will have a policeman to direct traffic, but remember to turn around at the dead end of the road and park heading out. We have had folks park down by Camp Ledgewood so be very careful of children on the road. You can also drop the young and old at the driveway. Just please don't create a traffic jam. It is also a muddy mess after such a mild winter so please dress for the farm.

Admission is \$10 for adults and \$5 for children. Admission is our fundraiser to pay for hay and capital improvements for the flock. 10% of all sales goes to the Cuyahoga Valley National Park. You can order your tickets at www.TheSpicyLamb.com, but cash sales at the gate are also available. There are also a few limited seats left for the egg hunt brunch at 10am.

- Sallie Bear and Charlotte Reed reported that 99 surveys were returned for the feasibility study far surpassing the 30% we were told by Episcopal Church Foundation to expect.
- Guy Wylie updated the vestry on current building projects.
 Work on Beebe House will wait until funds are available.
 The stain on the steps to the chapel will be redone at no charge. Most of the lightbulbs in the building have been re placed with the new LED bulbs.
