

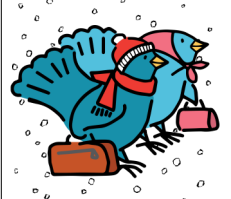

**Diocese Canon: Title II, Canon 1, Section 3(a):** In every Parish of the Diocese, there shall be held an Annual Meeting, for the election of members of the Vestry and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before such meeting. Unless otherwise provided (by Articles of Incorporation, By-Laws, or by Resolution), such meeting shall be held on the third Sunday of January in each year.

**Diocese Canon: Title II, Canon 1, Section 5(a):** All members of the Parish who are communicants in good standing as defined by the Canons of the Episcopal Church and not being under sixteen years of age shall be qualified to vote in its meetings.

There will be a planned activity in the Parish Hall for children.

## Rector's Reflections



Dear Friends,

As I write this on December 22 and stare January in the eye, and as Covid continues to affect many aspects of our lives and our life together, I wonder what January will bring. Will we be able to have our Annual Meeting in person? Hopefully. Will we ever be able to burn our masks? Maybe. How will the pandemic affect our ability to do the work of the church? As much as we will let it.

I would like to offer three characteristics of Christ Church that will help us weather whatever storms are ahead and will help us ride the waves of uncertainty Covid continues to provide.

1. This parish is historically resilient and flexible. Throughout the entire history of Christ Church (all 179 years) there have been challenges, some significant enough to threaten the future of the parish. And yet people have always come together to make a difference, trusted in God's guidance and wisdom, and the parish has ultimately flourished.
2. We know we are better together! While life may be overwhelming when we try to tackle our challenges alone, when we come together to pray, sing, learn, and connect with each other and God, the burdens are easier to carry.
3. We have a "can-do" attitude. The question is not whether or not we can do something but how we are going to do it. We may have to do things differently (see #1) or do new things rather than former things, but we look for where God is at work and do the work God has given us to do.

So, we head into 2022 with lots of unknowns, but some things that never change. We will keep putting one foot in front of the other, together, trusting that God will lead us through whatever the future holds. And we will do the work God is calling us to do!

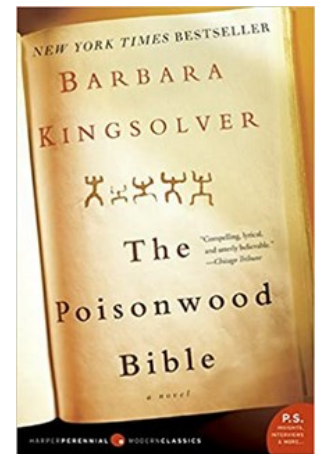

## WORDS AND WISDOM BOOK DISCUSSION

**January 26 at 8:00 p.m. on Zoom**

Women of Christ Church and First Presbyterian are invited to join Sarah Bhatia monthly for a book discussion. For the month of January, we will be discussing The first half (books 1-3) of The Poisonwood Bible by Barbara Kingslover. This is a story told by the wife and four daughters of Nathan Price, a fierce, evangelical Baptist who takes his family and mission to the Belgian Congo in 1959. They carry with them everything they believe they will need from home, but soon find that all of it—from garden seeds to Scripture—is calamitously transformed on African soil. What follows is a suspenseful epic of one family's tragic undoing and remarkable reconstruction over the course of three decades in postcolonial Africa. ## **Save the Date! Bishop John to Visit Christ Church on January 30.**

The Rt. Rev. John Garba Danbinta will join us at Christ Church on Sunday, January 30<sup>th</sup>. Bishop John is the Bishop of Gusau, one of the 10 dioceses within the Anglican Province of Kaduna (Nigeria). In his 16 years as Bishop, he has never given up on his *vision to bring a new school with a full curriculum to the children of Gusau irrespective of their background, faith, or economic status*. He also has been committed to improving health care. Two American non-profits, the African Education Partnership (AEP) and Kateri Medical Services have been formed to collaborate with Bishop John. Leaders in the Diocese of Ohio and Connecticut, including parishioner Paul Frank, are working closely with Bishop John. Paul currently serves as an Emeritus Board Member of AEP.

During his visit, Bishop John will share his story and the status of schools and clinics in Gusau, as well as a perspective of the many challenges facing his flock and all the people of Gusau. Stay tuned for specific details and save the date to spend time with Bishop John.

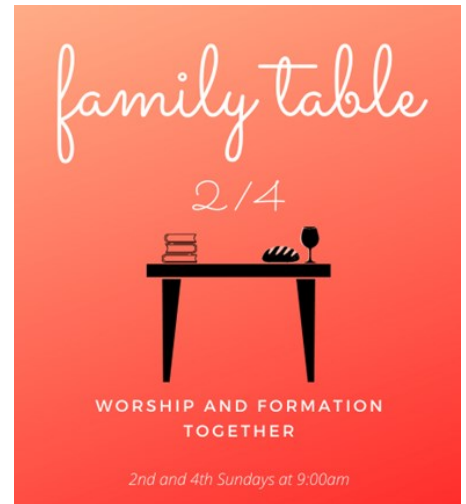
## CHILDREN'S CHAPEL

I always found it strange how in the secular world, Christmas music seems to start in November but then stops the day after Christmas Day. As Episcopalians following a liturgical season, we remember that the Christmas season doesn't just stop at Christmas Day, it continues on. Technically in the church calendar, the celebration of Christmas continues on until February 2nd with the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple, sometimes referred to as the *Purification of St. Mary the Virgin* or *Candlemas*.

*Candlemas* receives its origins from Luke 2:22-40, particularly from The Song of Simeon "a light to lighten the Gentiles and glory of your people Israel." We start every Advent with the lighting of the Advent wreath and it is fulfilled with the blessings of candles at *Candlemas*. Why am I saying all of this? Why should you care? Well, you don't have to but if you've read this far then you're at a good start! We celebrate liturgical seasons and the season of Christmas with its starting on Christmas Eve night, continues on for a month. ## CHRISTIAN UNITY PRAYER SERVICE AND LUNCHEON - JANUARY 20



The annual Christian Unity Prayer Service and Luncheon is scheduled for Thursday, January 20 at St. Mary Catholic Church in Hudson. The ecumenical service, led by local clergy, begins at 10:00 AM. It is followed by a luncheon and guest speaker. The service, traditionally held during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, has the theme, "We saw his star in the East, and we came to worship him" (Matthew 2:2). Rev. Lawrence Jurcak of St. Mary's Parish will give the sermon.

After the service, a box lunch will be served for ticket holders. The box lunches are catered by Nosh's of Hudson. Ticket price is \$15.00 per person and may be obtained from Gretchen Green. **The reservation deadline is January 9.** The prayer service is free and open to all; it does not require a ticket to attend.

Our featured speaker after the luncheon is Rev. Nayiri Karjian, from Living Water Association. An Armenian Christian born and raised in Aleppo, Syria, she was educated in Beirut, Lebanon and received her Master of Divinity degree from Lancaster Theological Seminary in Pennsylvania. Since her ordination in 1985 she has served UCC congregations in several cities throughout the United States.

- \* **Why do you want to serve on the Christ Church vestry and what gifts do you bring to the vestry?**
- \* **What are your current involvements at Christ Church?**
- \* **What challenges do you see for Christ Church in the years ahead and what strengths does Christ Church have to meet those challenges?**

### **Why do you want to serve on the Christ Church vestry and what gifts do you bring to the vestry?**

Being invited to serve on the Vestry is an honor beyond imagining. My husband and I only joined the Christ Church community at the beginning of COVID restrictions and so this invitation is a matter of faith and trust. I can't speak to any special gifts, but I can offer a passion for sharing the gospel, an optimistic spirit, a heart for service, and as a retiree, flexibility and time. I have had professional experience as a teacher and member of a school administrative team. The Episcopal Church is the faith community of my youth and this feels like a continuation of the "unbroken circle."

### **What are your current involvements at Christ Church?**

I spend time on the balcony many Sundays as a member of the media team. My job is the camera operation for those attending the service online. I am a regular Compline attendee and have participated in the periodic Theological Reflections. I had hoped to be part of this year's Education for Ministry and am eager for it to take place next year.

### **What challenges do you see for Christ Church in the years ahead and what strengths does Christ Church have to meet those challenges?**

Some of the challenges facing Christ Church are not unique. On a macro level, I suspect many churches today will agree being relevant, and even more being vibrant and essential, is a tough mission in today's culture, especially when the Church has become political and when stands have pushed people away rather than embracing them. I believe one of the most beautiful messages in our weekly communion service is when Charlotte says (paraphrased), "This is God's table, and wherever you are on your faith walk, you are welcome here." In a nutshell that should be our message, and I love the idea of being part of the team figuring out how to share it with the world.

On a micro level, Christ Church is a victim of geography. Urban churches face their own particular challenges, but the community they long to serve is right on their doorstep – sometimes sleeping in their pews! We can support programs financially, which is important. We can participate in regular activities, but they are often a distance away. A challenge is to embrace and enlarge a community that is intergenerational and diverse as we share God's love with each other and beyond our walls and town boundaries. However, I am mindful of a beautiful hymn, "People need the Lord," and that means all people. Yes, the poor, the marginalized, the widows and orphans. The tax collectors and prostitutes. The slaves, women and children. But also the fishermen, the rich young ruler, the leaders of the temple, the Roman centurion and even Pilate.

In my time of worship with the Christ Church community my husband Jack and I have been blessed mightily by the warmth, caring, encouragement, and grace offered by everyone we have met. THAT is our greatest strength. Next is strong leadership, from our rector Charlotte, through past and present vestry and other volunteers, to those of us eager to step up and join the throng. As long as there are people, there is church, and there is mission – to proclaim the truth of the love of Jesus and live it out. As for the rest, we will all figure it out together!

### **Why do you want to serve on the Christ Church vestry and what gifts do you bring?**

Growing up Episcopalian, serving on the vestry was always something I had heard about but was almost always done by elders of the Church. Mind you, as an 8-year-old kid, age 40 would have been considered an elder, so here we are. Christ Church has given much to my family and me in the time that Allison and I have been attending; from the friendships created, guidance given, wedding hosted, and sanity and fellowship granted in the dark days of the pandemic. I personally have been impressed by the flexibility of the leadership guiding us through the rough seas of the past 2 years, and by all that has been accomplished amidst it, including the success of the major construction project and sensible management of the budget. Most of all, the growth and welcoming of new congregants into Christ Church, along with the active encouragement to be involved in Church life, is why I am here today.

I previously worked in government and politics (back when things were considerably less contentious than they are today) and currently work in finance. Currently, I am most visibly involved in the Christ Church Choir, which gives me a creative and worship outlet that was previously much lacking in my life. I also am involved in EfM, which I encourage anyone and everyone to do when they find the time. Previously I was the Zoom Usher during the dark days of the pandemic; I was both so blessed to do so and am also thankful it is no longer necessary!

### **Challenges in the years ahead and strengths**

The challenges Christ Church is facing are much the same as many other main-line churches: largely, engaging new people while being mindful of existing congregants. Hudson and the surrounding communities thankfully are adding new people all the time, and ensuring that Christ Church is visible and welcoming to them is vital to keeping the Church moving forward. I'm delighted to see so many new people joining, especially young families, although we need to be sure that our ministry continues to appeal to and positively impacts all ages. Finally, we have a diverse congregation of many viewpoints, and being open minded and accepting is important. The strength of Christ Church in facing future challenges lies in the people of the Church and our ongoing commitment to displaying Christ's love for all of us to the world.

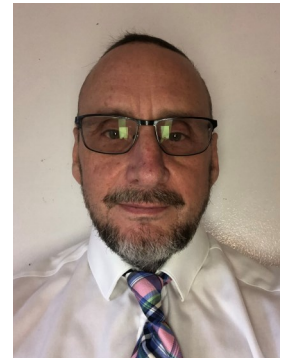

- Pam Zuhl, Sallie Bear, and Doug Harvey were thanked for their faithful service on the Christ Church vestry as this was their final meeting.
- The vestry reviewed the mask policy for Sunday worship and determined that the policy will stay the same through January.
- The vestry reviewed the most up-to-date version of the 2022 budget and had an executive session at the end of the meeting to discuss pay raises for the staff.
- At the end of November, \$71,000 in pledges was yet to be received for 2021.
- Pam Zuhl reported that Judy Brookhart, Tina Monreal, and Jake Phillips have agreed to run for and serve on vestry. RuthAnne Belton, Ellen Turner, and Malcolm Robbie have agreed to run for and serve as our Diocesan Convention Delegates.
- Charlotte will have been at Christ Church 6 years next May, which makes her eligible for a 12 week sabbatical per her letter of agreement. She plans to take June 6-September 5. The Rev. Allan Belton will cover during Charlotte's time away.
- Based on the results of the Cottage Conversations, the following goals were set for 2022:
  - ◊ Continue to develop our middle school youth formation program.
  - ◊ Developing our outreach in conjunction with the desire for more fellowship
  - ◊ Further develop ways of communicating with the congregation and the community.
  - ◊ Vestry members will serve as liaisons to the goals, making sure that progress is made.
- The vestry approved the Rector's housing allowance for 2022.
