

WORDS AND WISDOM BOOK DISCUSSION

November 15 at 8:00 p.m. on Zoom

Women of Christ Church and First Presbyterian are invited to join Sarah Bhatia monthly for a book discussion. For the month of November, we will join together for discussion of The First Advent in Palestine: Reversals, Resistance, and the Ongoing Complexity of Hope by Kelley Nikondeha. Trusted scholar and community organizer Kelley Nikondeha takes us back, to where the landscape of Palestine is once again the geographic, socioeconomic, and political backdrop for the Advent story. Reading the Advent narratives of Luke and Matthew anew, in their original context, changes so much about how we see the true story of resistance, abusive rulers and systems of oppression, and God coming to earth. Throughout her explorations, Nikondeha features the stories of modern-day Palestinians, centering their voices to help us meet an Advent recognizable for today. This thought-provoking examination invites us into a season of discovery, one that is realistic and honest, and that still wonders at the goodness of God's grace. Recollections from a former Christ Church Chorister

This summer we heard from Annie Hogdes (Greer) about her time as a Young Chorister at Christ Church. In this two part series, we now hear from her sister, Kate Greer, about her time as a Young Chorister. The Young Choristers Program at Christ Church is a way for children to be leaders in the church through music. We pray together, learn about music, sharpen their musical skills, and learn the importance of music in the church. The program is free and offers opportunities for the Choristers to sing outside of our walls. Enjoy reading and I hope it sparks your interest in the program!

1. How long were you a chorister?

I was a chorister from age 7-15. Even after I stopped regularly singing in the choir, I still came back for major church holidays and the occasional anthem.

2. What is an important lesson you learned as a chorister that has helped you in your adult life?

As a young chorister, I learned a lot about commitment and practice during those Thursday evening rehearsals. Every week, we had to practice extensively and be determined in order to perform a "finished project" for the congregation on Sundays. When you're a young kid, taking the deliberate time to learn and polish a three minute choral anthem can result in a more committed and patient attitude towards approaching other projects.

3. What does being a "Young Chorister" mean to you?

Being a young chorister was always a source of artistry and comradery for me. I was able to express myself through song and musicality, and even as a little kid, I could comprehend the beauty of choral voices singing in a space with awesome acoustics. I also got to make a lot of friends. Back in those days, the young choristers formed a tight-knit community, complete with funny games, nicknames, inside jokes, and shared love for performing a type of music that most kids our age thought was old-fashioned.

4. Did you ever have a time in your chorister journey that you wanted to stop doing it? If so, how did you motivate yourself to stay?

When you're in elementary school, attending weekly choir practice at your church can get a little tedious. Plus, the kids at school look at you funny when you say you're in your church choir. The friendships with other choristers certainly kept me committed, but even more than that, the transformational experiences I had as a chorister helped me realize that what I was doing was unique and impactful. I've performed in major cathedrals across the country, and I even got to do a choral residency in England back in 2011. After our performances, people from all walks of life would come up to us and thank us for the music. Seeing the impact we had on people definitely motivated me to stay in the choir and continue giving to the community.

5. As someone who was a chorister, what advice would you give to parents who are thinking about choristers for their children?

Your child will never regret that they learned to read music at a young age. They will also make new friends and see the church from a whole new perspective.

6. How did being a chorister strengthen your faith?

Being a chorister really introduced me to the idea that faith is bigger than the individual. Fellowship is such an integral part of being a chorister, and uplifting God as a group through music can truly strengthen a person's devotion to the Body of Christ. I also have several distinct memories of encountering the Holy Spirit through beautiful choral music, even when I was in second grade!

7. Did you find that being active in the music program gave you a new appreciation for the church?

I love the Episcopal Church for so many reasons, and I never would have had that appreciation for our church had it not been for kids' choir. Singing choral music has strengthened my devotion to church tradition and the worship of God through artistry.

8. Do you still geek out on choral music?

I still have all of my favorite anthems from 10 years ago completely memorized. They are some of my favorite songs to this day.

October Vestry Meeting Highlights



The Christ Church vestry met on Tuesday, October 25 at 6pm in the Upper Room. The meeting began with a Bible Study on this month's "Fruit of the Spirit" which is joy.

- Ann Kirk, our acting treasurer, reported that pledge income was down in September. The endowment portfolio has lost about \$247,000 in market value over the past year.
- The vestry set goals for 2023:
 - -Continuing our work on Christian formation for children and youth
- Working with our families (using an expansive understanding of "family" to learn more about their wants and needs regarding church and implementing plans where possible to meet those desires.
- Increasing our hospitality with intentional programs designed to connect new folks as well as current parishioners and families with others at Christ Church as well as ministry opportunities.
- The vestry adopted a revised personnel handbook which will go into effect on January 1, 2023.
- Kathy Garber gave a report on our current situation with regards to pledges for 2023. As of the vestry meeting, we have 83 pledges with 5 more promised on the way. We had 119 pledges for 2022. Of the pledges that have been received, 31 pledges were increased, 5 decreased and there are 7 new pledges.
- Kathy Garber reported that all the work on Beebe House (painting, new railings, new shutters, new light) has been completed.
- The next meeting is Tuesday, November 29 at 6pm in the Upper Room.
